Singing group meets at Victoria Terrace on the first Tuesday of each month at 7.30 pm.



Log book from Sunday 15th April 2018 – on returning from Morningside cemetery* Ted explained very carefully that they had been listening to sounds, and drawing them to show how loud or soft they were. Jacob drew a bar chart and represented birds and cars by the level on the chart. Ted drew shapes and showed the level of noise by the size of the shape and the edges off it, e.g the wind in the centre was in an oval shape to show it was an even level of sound, and the bird had a star shape around it to show the level changed. A bird sounds almost as loud as a car when you are in the cemetery

Urgent activity then had to happen on what felt like the first day of Spring. No stones or bones were moved.


