Area Meeting will be held at Central Edinburgh on the evening of **Mon 20 Jan**, 7-9 pm.


We have **Local Meeting for Business** after Meeting on Sun 26 Jan. Finish by 2.

Hearing from us by email



What we do with data – an occasional reminder, and our Privacy Notice

We followed the principles of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) for many years before it came into force in 2018. GDPR stresses that we should make it clear what data we hold, and why. We need active permission to keep non-essential details, or pass anything on. See also our info about emails (p2).

We keep contact details of members, and of attenders who have opted in to this, in our Local and Area Meetings records, and with General Meeting for Scotland. We don't pass details on to any other organisations, and we ask your permission before we publish them in our Book of Members.

We have to contact each other in order to function as a Society. So if you've given us your address, phone number, email, etc, we don't need additional consent to use them for core activities, but you can change your preferences about how we contact you at any time.

You can ask for your name to be removed from our records, and so far as we are able, we will do that. We are obliged to keep some of our records for varying time periods by law. Some non-sensitive records (minutes of our business meetings, for example) may be kept indefinitely as they are deemed historical. 
MORE NEWS AND DATES

BOURBONS ON THE WEB

The film is said to be one of the first film documentaries, and shows a mix of manual and newly automated production, and some notably young employees. And what a lot of people it took.

A longer version at <https://youtu.be/nC6o2ZIQIFs> starts with churns of milk arriving, and stoking the boilers to power the machinery, and is intercut with views of modernised processes in the mid 1980s. Spoken over it is a lovely, fond commentary from 1980s workers, just before the Bermondsey works closed.

Our second **Wikipedia page of the month** is **Bourbon biscuit** (214 views/day). Celebrate its 110th birthday, as the first mass-produced cream sandwich, produced by Peek Frean's under the name 'Creola' in 1910.

The Wikipedia page is disappointingly short and could benefit from your input. A quick Internet browse reveals many probably apocryphal stories that probably can't earn a place there. For instance, that it was the first biscuit eaten on the moon. The recipes for making them at home look good though.
