

Minutes of the Local Meeting for Business, Sunday 18 October 2015 were circulated.

There were no matters arising from last meeting.

1/16 Special Collections for 2016

We considered the draft list of charities etc prepared by Susan Robertson and agreed twelve further organisations for support up to January 2017 (*March: Beyond FGM. Full list in the next issue.*)

We confirmed the priority of half Quakers and half small / local / marginalised groups for support and agreed to review criteria before next selection process next year. We thanked Susan Robertson for her investigations and Sylvia Massey for agreeing to alert named people each month.

2/16 Review of the "Welcome to our Local Meeting" leaflet

We discussed some small changes in the Welcome leaflet and asked David Somervell to liaise with Stasa Morgan-Appel in updating text and printing some for distribution.

3/16 Promoting the Spiritual Life of the Meeting

We agreed to continue the informal Meetings for Learning – sometimes after Local Meeting / sometimes at a friend's home – where either Quaker Faith and Practice chapter or perhaps material identified in the new Being Friends Together website is discussed. Exploring Spirituality

Sat 6 Feb. Bob Harwood: Reconciling Spirituality and Science. It is widely assumed that science is implacably opposed to religion and spiritual ideas. Or, "Science without religion is lame. Religion without science is blind." - Einstein.

Sat 12 Mar. Rev. Paul Newton: Rudolf Steiner and Modern Spirituality. Rudolf Steiner (1861-1925) developed Anthroposophy as a modern 'spiritual science'.

Sat 2 April. Simon Jackson: Fuzzy definitions and personal choice. Exploring the 2014 Swarthmore Lecture. Has the absence of teaching Quakerism within the Society of Friends allowed everything to bequestioned and related to personal choice?

Sat 7 May. Helen Holt: Mysticism, **psychology and Rufus Jones**. Today's Liberal Quakerism owes much to Rufus Jones and his psychologically informed interpretation of Quakerism as a mystical religion.

Sat 25 June. Jim Pym: The message of the myth. In 1988, Joseph Campbell, the distinguished scholar of 'myth', gave six hour-long recorded conversations with veteran journalist, Bill Moyers, entitled 'The Power of the Myth'. The second of these will be shown here. Jim will lead a discussion afterwards.

Sat 16 July. Janet Saunders: Playing with the cosmos: The journey of the soul from Plato to Ficino.
