Cover Photo - Protests in London

Deidre sends the photo of Roisin Armstrong which appeared on a New Statesman blog after the first protest against the rise in tuition fees on 4 Dec which was billed as a 'carnival against the cuts'. She was asking the policeman 'how can you work for a government which is asking you to do this?' She said 'the police are going to get cut too' He said 'do you not think you are all misinformed?' and then 'you are always protesting about one thing or another' She asked 'have you got kids who might want to study? Will you be able to afford it?'

Not long afterwards she felt that picture was taken a very long time ago because so much had happened. At Millbank some of her friends were hurt by the police when they had done nothing. They had a demo the week after this where they got kettled which seems to mean the police standing at every place it might be possible to get out and barring the exit. She was there for 4 hours and some of her friends for 8. There were police charges which were scary. Then a week later another protest where they ran in small groups all over the place and the police could not keep up and there seemed to be less violence. After that a group of students including her occupied the library at Goldsmiths for a few days.

Then she was in Parliament Sq and she was terrified - not in the path of police horses but watching and then kettled, then managing to run out but with friends who then got kicked by police as they had been pushed over in a charge trying to get out. Very disillusioned with lib dems, police, British democracy etc.

It all seems so sad when they have so much energy and imagination and such a lot of humour!. There were lots of individual banners - 'don't put us in the red, cut trident instead', 'rich parents for everyone' They are so worried about what will happen to everyone when these tuition charges come in. Wiston Lodge - South Edinburgh Meeting's weekend away, 10-12 September 2010

Our theme was **Community and Reflection**. From Friday evening's very warming and inclusive singing session with children joining us at the end, followed by help to relax from Susan Robertson and finding out about secret friends through to the chance to do Xiang Gong with Margaret on the grass in the sun – it was a weekend of community. Children and some adults took part in a puppetmaking workshop with Emma – wonderful figures emerged which then came to life at the ceilidh in the evening making us laugh! The other side of the theme – more reflectively a group spent time on 'Writing a spiritual journal' with Rachel. Those who took part found it powerful.

After lunch a group went on a walk up a local hill (not Tinto) with David with a lovely view while the children played games which became more and more energetic (for the adults who joined in!) but then we could relax with Margaret's gentle massage workshop.

Most of the adults took part in a discussion on 'Living in a Religious Community' led by Meg and Mary.

A wealth of knowledge appeared from several people which deepened the discussion. We could have spent longer but our energising delicious Wiston food called us The ceilidh was wonderfully MC'd by Daniel and had lots of contributions from jokes to songs to serious things. We finished it with a few dances – both ceilidh and circle dances.

Sunday

After our Xiang Gong opportunity we had All Age Worship with Lanark Meeting and people from Penicuik and Peebles joined us. Emma describes the All Age Worship:

I thought of the busyness that community can bring which gets in the way of reflection. My experience of the last years has been one of the necessity of the existence of communities for me personally to allow for space for reflection so I wanted to allow us to be busy as a community in a reflective manner, this meant doing something physical occupying our hands in such a way that our thought could be quietly directed. The activity was making an ornamental hanging: choosing and using beads, bells, shells and buttons - all fairly large and ornate.

Rufus talked about the tradition of hanging significant objects akin to rosary beads and the children offered the boxes and baskets of shells etc. Each member of the group had a length of fish wire with a wooden bead on the end as a stopper, onto which they could thread their beads etc. The silence was broken by the rustle and clink of beads etc, as each went to work. It was delightful, and many styles, lengths and patterns were created. Ministry followed and we listened to talk of distracters and distraction.

One person spoke of her discomfort in making her hanging; she found herself envying the beauty of another's creation. Another spoke of her hive whose queen bee had died and the necessity to distract the

other bees whilst she introduced a new queen otherwise the whole hive would not survive. For me it was a joy to share and interesting to think about how generally I view the concept of distraction in such a negative sense

Finally we were inspired by an extraordinary illustrated talk by Catherine Holmes about her experiences living and working with South African children in a school for orphans.

A huge thank you to everyone who contributed to making it such a diverse and yet wonderfully cohesive weekend.

During 2010 the Area Meeting decided to take forward a programme of improvements to the meeting house at 7 Victoria Terrace, including replacing the windows of the meeting room and the hall with double-glazed units, refurbishing the kitchen and refurbishing the toilet areas. A small fundraising group was appointed and they have been working on an Appeal designed to raise funds for this work. This will be launched during the summer of 2011.

However, the Trustees would like to complete the work of replacing the windows as soon as possible. They are looking for Friends who could make an **interest-free loan** to the meeting for a period of about two years (while the Appeal is under way) to help to fund this initial work.
