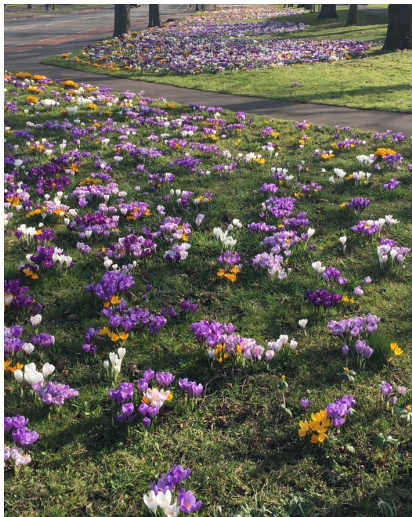




SOUTH EDINBURGH MEETING

OTHER QUAKER EVENTS

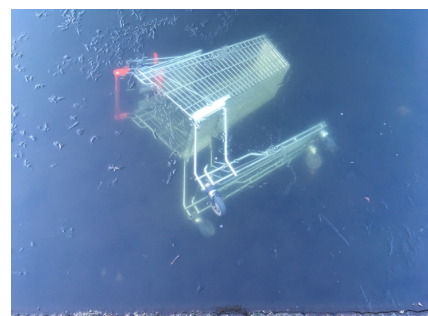

Refugees

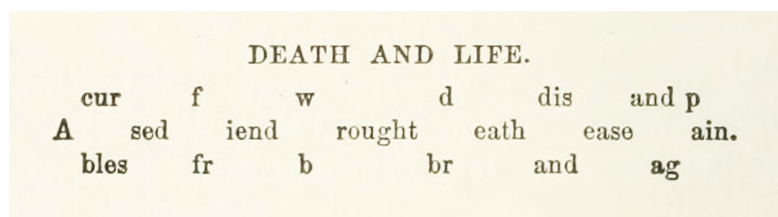
They have no need of our help

Appears as 'The Origin of Life and Death' in "The citizen poets of Boston: A collection of forgotten poems 1789-1820" edited by Paul Lewis.

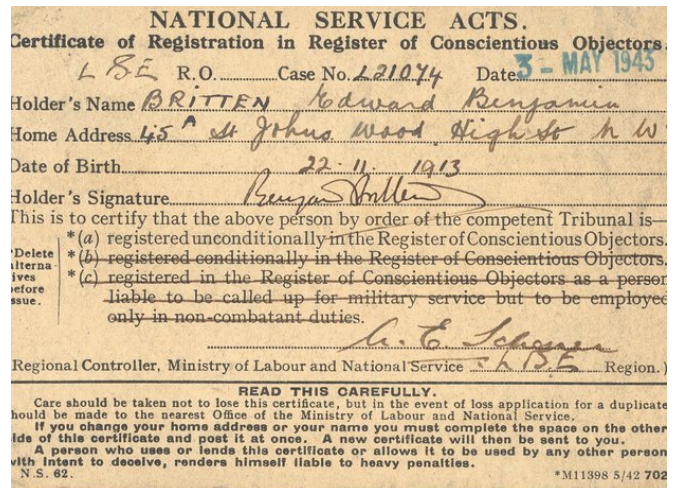

National War Museum, Hospital Square, Edinburgh Castle. An exhibition exploring the little-known story of British conscientious objectors of the Second World War through paintings, poems, letters, music and speeches. It emerges from a major research project into COs in Britain led by the University of Edinburgh.

Following the stories of conscientious objectors, the exhibition will examine the application process, the reasons people had for opposing conscription, and what happened to them as a result. If successful in their application, conscientious objectors could be exempted from national service altogether, or more commonly assigned to other non-combatant roles such as bomb disposal, hospital work or agricultural labour. Some of those whose applications were unsuccessful were ultimately imprisoned.

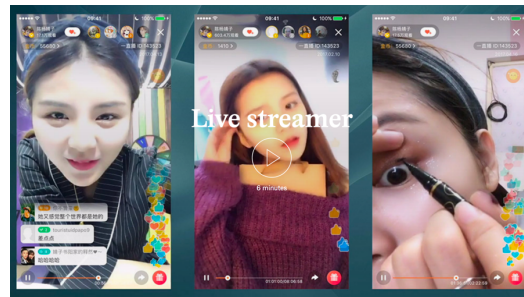
During the Second World War, over 60,000 men and women chose not to fight for religious, political or moral reasons, including many Quakers. The Library and Archives at Friends House are lending a small number of objects and have provided some images for use on graphic panels in the exhibition.
