We opened with a reading from Harvey Gilman on the nature of Quakerism (QFP 20.20)

Matters arising from Minutes of previous meeting

24/13 Talks after meeting for worship and meetings for learning - We recorded thanks for Anna Mitchell's talk in November on her work with those involved in domestic violence – especially the hope that new approaches can help address behaviours.

Alastair Cameron offered to lead a reflection on impact of austerity on poverty in Edinburgh. Elders and Overseers will consider this and other possible future topics.

26/13 Representative on the Open Door Board - We thanked Martin Williams for representing us on the Board of the Open Door.

27/13 Our weekend away at Wiston Lodge Fri 5 - Sun 7 September 2014

We thanked Phil Noble for his work managing the bookings over many years. Deirdre & Susie seek volunteers to assist in this and other aspects of organising the away weekend.

1/14 Establishment of new Portobello and Musselburgh Local Meeting

Alastair Cameron told us about the new Meeting recognised by December 2013 Area Meeting. He recounted how David Turner and Janet Fenton had initiated a Sunday evening Meeting for Worship 15 years ago. This has now grown to a vibrant group worshiping monthly on 1st Sunday evening and 2nd and 4th Sunday at 10.30am.

Chris Booth is Clerk, Kim Smith Assistant Clerk, Mary-Jane Elton, Life of the Meeting Clerk and Vanessa Ferrato, Treasurer. Premises are under review – along with Eldership and Oversight for both our meetings. Alastair agreed to place a note in The Friend.

We welcomed these moves as an organic process and, despite losing worship every week with such lovely friends, we agreed to come together each year at Wiston.

2/14 Recognising important roles people play to support our Meeting

3/14 Advocacy roles and responsibilities – liaising with our elected representatives

We thanked David Turner very much for leading our engagement with our MP and MSP and . heard that Area Meeting on 11 January had warmly supported the idea of appointing a Quaker Parliamentary Officer in Scotland and we considered how best to maintain our own communication with our MSP and MP at a meeting planned Sunday 26 January after Meeting for Worship.

4/14 Allocation of income from Minimart

In March 2013 we agreed that funds raised could be used "to support any urgent concern where our donation would make a difference to a smaller organisation. If no appropriate urgent need emerges sooner, the money will be allocated as one lump sum ..." We agreed to donate current balance to the Save the Children Syrian Appeal.

5/14 Concern from CAAT about inappropriate sponsorship of the Science Festival

We heard that the Edinburgh Campaign Against the Arms Trade has raised this issue with the Board of the Science Festival and we asked the Clerk to write a letter conveying our wish to see educational activities untainted by association with companies manufacturing arms.

Getting to Know – Christopher Speirs

So how is it that you are a Quaker?

I've been a Quaker all my life. My parents were both Quakers.I went to children's meeting until I was about thirteen years old and then I joined the adult meeting. That was in Birkenhead where we lived. I went to two Quaker schools: Bootham School which is in York, and after a year I moved to Ackworth school, four miles outside Pontefract. Following that I was a trainee at Kew Garden in London. I chose to join South Edinburgh Meeting because I knew people there.

How did it happen that you have a flat near the Edinburgh Botanic Garden?

My father encouraged me to buy this flat at Boat Green, Canonmills. The idea was to be near to my work at the Botanic Garden. I was in the garden every week day plus 12-6 in the glass houses on occasional week ends. I like living here up on the top floor. But my father wouldn't have liked the stairs. You can see for miles, right across to Corstorphine Hill. I'd like to do the garden here but it's not mine to do. That's a bit sad.

And daily life now?

I was born a month before the first Christmas of World War II and I am now 74 years old. I like living in Edinburgh with all the visitors of every nationality under the sun.

I'm reading Inspector Poirot. I like classical music. I am very keen on ties, as this photograph shows!

Tesco's is next door. It's a wonderful firm. Sometimes I go up the road to the café in M&S in Princes Street. I did evening classes at the university in history. I still get the magazine 'History Today'.

What about your family?

I have two younger brothers: David, who is a dentist in Canada and Richard who worked as a GP in Arbroath

My mother, Jessie was a good gardener and potter. I've actually got two of her paintings. She died a long time ago, and my father re-married Moira with whom I'm often in touch. I regard my step-mother as my real mother now.

I had a stroke a few years ago which has affected my memory, so I get a bit of help from social workers. My step-mother, Moira, is on her own now because my father, Claude died recently. He was a great cook, especially of apple pie.




South Edinburgh Friends continue to be very generous in contributing food and cash to our local food bank at Southhouse, and by Mid March we have been able to send £160 and a wide selection of tinned food. I am very grateful to the car owners involved. The staff at the Food bank greatly welcome our involvement and told us that last month the number of families needing help was larger than ever before.

As families can normally only receive help 3 times in a 6 month period it is misleading to hear it said that people are "living off" food banks. They can only provide for emergencies such as delay in benefit payments (the main cause) or other emergencies. Those coming to the Food bank have frequently had to walk a long way to get there and bringing their children too. With no spare cash a mishap is rapidly a catastrophe.
