Full minutes have been circulated by email, but please ask if you need a paper copy. Key points:


- We welcomed two new members, Angela and Rosamund, and noted the number of new attenders that we have welcomed recently.
- We recorded memorial minutes for three Friends (Sue, Jenny, Annette).
- Accounts our rent for the Open Door (around £80 per week) is now £1000 per annum greater than

Hidden and not in plain sight

Morningside Hydropathic – Morningside College – Royal Hospital for Sick Children

At the West end of Craiglea Drive, just by the boundary of the Craighouse estate, you can see a row of Victorian houses that don't look so very different from others in the area. But they sit on the site of a substantial building with a short life. Its entrance was on Morningside Drive shortly before it turns sharply North and downhill (see map at top of p3). The Eastern boundary of its grounds was St Clair Terrace.

This was conceived as Morningside Hydropathic Hotel, built in 1879 but just too late, at the end of a craze for such establishments. It was located at the foot of Easter Craiglockart Hill, overlooking open country and fresh air. It never opened as a hotel, but in 1882 opened as Morningside College, a high school for boys. It must have seemed well equipped, with its swimming bath and theatre, and generous grounds. Its principal moved to establish another, smaller Edinburgh school after a few years, and the College seems to have closed around 1889.





From 1890 to 1895 the building was renamed Plewlands House and accommodated the Royal Hospital for Sick Children (RHSC). The RHSC had to leave its inadequate premises at the foot of Lauriston Lane after a fatal outbreak of typhoid. The staff were impressed by the ward space in the new building, but found its size daunting, and its location too distant from the centre of medicine in Edinburgh. The swimming bath was converted to a laundry. In 1895 the hospital moved out to their grand, purpose-built hospital in Sciennes.

Plewlands House was demolished in about 1900. Morningside Grove was driven through its grounds, and new housing built over most of its site. Only the sizeable nursery garden to the South remained a while longer. Today it's hard to picture any of this history, though there are signs of the perimeter, and probably there are reused stones in the houses that replaced it.
