Clerk wanted for South Edinburgh business meeting

I'm coming to the end of my term as clerk of South Edinburgh business meeting, and Elders and Overseers are on the look out for someone to take over the job. With that in mind, they have asked me to write a short description of what the job entails.

First a little background. In many (most?) meetings, the role of clerk is rather broad: as well as facilitating business meetings, the clerk gives notices after meeting for worship, is the central point for correspondence, and so on. All this is quite a big job for one person to take on, so in South Edinburgh we decided a few years back to divide up these roles.

My job as clerk has therefore been purely concerned with our business meetings. There are normally five meetings per year (although there is a proposal in the table to reduce the number to perhaps three a year). Meetings are usually on a Sunday at the Open Door, after meeting for worship, and they tend to last a couple of hours. The tasks involved are:

- Getting the agenda together. Alison Chalmers has been helping me with this. There are often matters arising from previous meetings, so it's useful to look through previous minutes. Anyone in meeting can also ask for an item to be put on the agenda. I try to give a sentence or too of background to the agenda items, rather than just a title. It's helpful for everyone if the agenda can be circulated a week in advance, but I haven't often managed this. I have also found that Friends do tend to want to add things to the agenda at the last moment you might need to be strict if the agenda is already looking busy.
- On the day of the meeting, the job is really about holding the space for the meeting. Remember that this is a meeting for worship with attention to business all that we do comes out of our waiting in silence for the 'promptings of love and truth in our hearts'. You have a co-clerk to help you with all this! You need to
 - encourage people to finish their coffee and socialising and gather in silence;
 - be clear when it's time to move from silence to the agenda items;
 - make sure everyone gets the chance to contribute on the topic, but be clear that Friends need to stay on topic;
 - write a draft minute (with the help of your co-clerk) and read this out; incorporate any
 suggested changes and come to a minute that expresses the feeling of the meeting. This
 needs good discernment of course, but fortunately there aren't often items where there is
 serious disagreement in our local meeting on the whole, it is less daunting than it sounds.
- Typing up the minutes after the meeting. This isn't a big job, as you have (at least in theory) already written the minutes, so it's just a matter of typing them out neatly.
- Distributing the minutes: they are sent out by email to the South Edinburgh email list, a copy goes to the newsletter editor to be included in the newsletter, and a copy to the clerk of Area Meeting (with a note of any items that need attention from AM).
- Archiving the minutes. An archive copy needs to be printed on special acid-free paper (this gets signed at the next meeting), and filed in a safe place.

It's not too huge a job altogether, and it's a great chance to learn about clerking a Quaker meeting if you haven't done that before. There are courses at Woodbrooke which you could go on if you want to learn more. If you think you might be interested in taking it on, I'd be very glad to have a chat about what's involved.
