More Events and News on the Back Page

Minutes of Local Meeting for Business 15 April 2018

- 1. **Opening Worship** During opening worship we heard 3.10 from Quaker Faith and Practice on right ordering for Quaker Meetings. We are mindful of Advices and Queries 14: "*Are our Meetings for church affairs held in the spirit of worship and dependence on the guidance of God?*" We reflected on Chapter 3 of Quaker Faith & Practice qfp.quaker.org.uk/chapter/3. There were 15 in attendance.
- 2. Minutes of our meeting held 4 February 2018 Matters Arising:
 - A Meeting was held on 24 March with our elected representative: Ian Murray MP. Three concerns were raised [fuller notes available from Deirdre]:
 - The growing hostility to people coming to the UK
 - The Arms Trade and the proposed Defence Diversification Agency and
 - The Human Rights dimensions of the EU Withdrawal Bill.
 - A Meeting for Learning is planned after Meeting for Worship on Sunday 20 May led by Susie Reade on The Sacred in Everyday Life
 - Invitation to represent us on Morningside Christian Aid committee remains open
 - Two names were considered for our second rep on AM Nominations Committee
 - Caring for those who are not able to attend Meeting for Worship Elders and Overseers have
 reflected on the Pastoral Care of all; we heard of arrangements for a Meeting for Worship to be held
 in the nursing home of a friend no longer able to live at home. All were encouraged to use Dial-aRide or TaxiCard to get to meeting; and we heard of offers for occasional lift home.

3. Preparing for the Area Meeting we host on 23 June

We heard that visits have been made to check suitability of Greenbank Church Halls and two large rooms have now been booked. We agreed to establish a small working group to liaise with Phil Lucas and Kate Arnot who will be clerking.

Catriona Courtier, Alison Burnley, Deirdre Armstrong and the clerk to attend an Area Meeting agendasetting discussion at 6.45pm, Monday 30 April at 7 Victoria Terrace.

Activities for young people (engaging them in preparations); helping homeless and vulnerable people in our community; and catering to be considered.

4. Sanctuary Everywhere – Our Local Meeting response

We heard that several friends have a long held concern about the social, cultural and human rights repercussions associated with the UK Government's "hostile environment" for foreigners.

We heard about the Meeting for Learning held on 18th March, which considered the implications of being a Sanctuary Meeting supported by Britain Yearly Meeting.

In that discussion it became clear that, because of the activities and interests of many members and attenders, several of the suggested Sanctuary Meeting activities are already being addressed.

We were made aware of the need for careful communication and the need to protect vulnerable people whose immigration status has not been resolved.

Our concerns around this issue lead us to move forward and to register with Friends House as a Sanctuary Meeting – with Esther Shreeve and David Somervell as correspondents.

5. Any Other Business

- The letter inviting Quaker Giving 2018 has been mailed out. We invited the following to speak after Meeting for Worship about funded work we can support:
 - Alison Burnley on Quaker Housing Trust
 - Margaret Anderson on supporting our Local Meeting
 - o Rici Marshall Cross on Young Friends General Meeting
- We decided to circulate by email the Primary Schools Cooperative Games and Conflict Resolution programme appeal issued by the Peace and Justice Centre.
- We agreed to review our ad hoc donations policy for support given to eg. enable a Meeting to repair their roof / improve facilities when we set our 2019 budget.
- We noted that there is a vacancy for our meeting to be represented on the Open Door's management board.
- 6. Next Local Meetings for Worship for Business are on 27 May, 26 August and 28 October. Area Meetings are on 14 May, 23 June, 14 August, 22 September and 24 November.

Notes from our discussions when considering becoming a Sanctuary Meeting

- We are moved to take whatever small action we can, through many existing organisations, to support
 newcomers to Edinburgh and especially those fleeing political and human rights oppression, warfare
 and pestilence.
- We are aware of our relative privilege and we wish to bear witness against xenophobia* and racism in all their guises.

We heard that Tatiana Garavito, Quakers in Britain Programme Manager for Sanctuary Everywhere, offers the following support to Sanctuary Meetings:

- 1. **Update emails** with information about actions, policy work, articles and a lot more for meetings to explore. i.e.: Ideas for events for Refugee Week, Black History Month, articles with Quaker's stories from meetings, etc.
- 2. **A quarterly policy call** with all meetings to discuss the upcoming policy opportunities and our plans to work on them.
- 3. **Retreats and skill-share conferences**. One was held at the end of March. The next will be widely promoted once it has been planned.
- Resources: A booklet for meetings to learn more about detention, deportation and destitution are planned. A second one on power and privilege will help us to think about how to work <u>with</u> people as oppose to <u>for</u> people.
- 5. **Additional training:** Tatiana can also organise tailored training for local and area meetings if they need something special.

* Xenophobia: the fear and distrust of that which is perceived to be foreign or strange. Xenophobia can manifest itself in many ways involving the relations and perceptions of an ingroup towards an outgroup, including a fear of losing identity, suspicion of its activities, aggression, and desire to eliminate its presence to secure a presumed purity.

The terms xenophobia and racism are sometimes confused and used interchangeably because people who share a national origin may also belong to the same race. Due to this, xenophobia is usually distinguished by opposition to foreign culture.
