Minutes of Local Meeting for Business held Sun 16 July 2017

Opening Worship – During opening worship we heard 19.48 from Quaker Faith and Practice – a Testimony of William Penn concerning early Friends written in 1694. There were 13 in attendance.

2. Minutes of our meeting held on 30 April – Matters Arising:

- We heard that a submission had been made to the Scottish Government opposing fracking and supporting the draft Energy Strategy.
 We agreed that a response be prepared in response to the further consultation on the next Climate Change (Scotland) Bill due by 22 September.
 We hoped that Rachel Howell might contribute to this with the clerk with a draft being circulated for information / comments.
- We ask the clerk to enquire of Area Meeting Trustees about Gift Aid on Small Donations scheme which might be running in Area Meeting.

3. Supporting the Peace & Justice Centre

We recognised Quakers in our Area Meeting have consistently supported the work of the Peace and Justice Centre, and both Geoffrey Carnall and Elizabeth Seale Carnall were stalwart supporters – both by active volunteering and their financial support.

We would like to encourage individual Friends to support the charity by regular small giving and personal membership (details at <u>http://peaceandjustice.org.uk</u>), and we ask Area Meeting to consider becoming an Affiliate Member.

4. Promoting the spiritual life of our community

We heard that Esther Shreeve plans a further series of Becoming Friends sessions. All invited to sign the sheet at meeting indicating preferred times / days. Other topics also invited – e.g. Britain Yearly Meeting Gathering / more on Quaker Structures?

5. Celebrating 35 Years at the Open Door

Sue Freshwater – who represents Quakers on the Board of the Open Door – reported a lovely birthday celebration attended by well over 100 people at the Gillies Centre.

In a new initiative volunteers are preparing a Community Lunch on the first Sunday each month upstairs in the café area for local residents. They seek a guitar player. Childrens' Committee to note possible space restriction.

We asked the clerk to invite Joanne Dalton, Open Door Manager, to a future Meeting for Worship to share her vision for the community centre.


Our faith in action


