### Wiston Weekend



Every September South Edinburgh Quaker Meeting gathers for a weekend of fellowship in the tranquil surroundings of Wiston Lodge, near Biggar. This year over 40 people, aged between 4 months and eighty-something years (mostly but not exclusively from South Edinburgh) took part in the weekend. Some of us camped (1 night persistent noisy rain, 1 night clear and starry for those who like to know these things!), others stayed in the comfortable shared rooms of the Lodge, or came during the day only.

This was my 6th time at this annual Wiston gathering. I have enjoyed the event both with and without my daughter, so can vouch for the fact that the weekend is definitely not just for families; it is for anyone who wants to share time, space, good food, worship and optional activities in a beautiful natural setting with their fellow Quakers. I always come away feeling cared for, uplifted, rested, with both warm memories and new thoughts and ideas. I get to know people in my Meeting on a deeper and more sustaining level than I find possible in the regular Meeting for Worship or the hurried chat and coffee after.

Most activities derive from participants' own skills and their willingness to share these.

These included walks (short, medium or long) Xiang Kung on the lawn, singing groups, a writing workshop and a book-making workshop. The Saturday evening ceilidh, celebrating the shared enthusiasms of young and old, finished with a particularly fine Strip the Willow.



Wiston's outdoor activity centre can also be utilised, and this year a climbing wall, supervised by the delightful Wiston activities supervisor Stobie, was available for children and intrepid adults – the children worked well as a team to help and encourage each other and quite a few made it up to the top in great style

Sunday brought a thought-provoking All Age Worship with Lanark Meeting, who generously allow us to share (take over?) their Meeting each year. This was followed by some moving Worship sharing on the recent Sustainability minute from Yearly Meeting. After the famous Wiston Sunday lunch, it was time for goodbyes and a last chance for me to try and figure out who my lovely Secret Friend had been (I still don't know!)

The programme can look busy at first glance (and there is much more I have left out in my very brief resume) but all is optional. In fact it is often the informal moments with others or with the natural world that linger in my mind. Chatting, silence, eating, feeling good about being a Quaker, making a space to share ourselves or take time out in our normally over-busy or over-isolated lives.


#### **Quaker week thanks**
