# Minutes of Meeting for Worship for Business Sunday 4 September

### 3. Matters Arising from Minutes of our meeting held on 26 June

### Short Term Review Group: Minute from 26 July AM in Peebles

We considered the minute and the request for feedback from Local Meetings. We look forward to participating in the emerging new pattern of Area Meetings in 2017.

We welcome the idea for an **Area Meeting Communications Strategy** and the opportunity to contribute if this were to be requested. With busy lives and lots of activities we felt that carefully targeted communications are needed; and that – as well as the web and emails conforming to all necessary good accessibility practice – the needs of those who do not use email must be carefully considered.

# 350 years ago, the British equivalent of the Calais Jungle

100,000 people were made homeless by the Great Fire of London in 1666.

'The poor inhabitants were dispersed about St. George's Fields, and Moorfields, as far as Highgate, and several miles in circle, some under tents, some under miserable huts and hovels, many without a rag or any necessary utensils, bed or board, who from delicateness, riches, and easy accommodations in stately and well furnished houses, were now reduced to extremest misery and poverty.

The King announced that 'all Churches, Chappels, Schools, and other like Publick Places' should be available for safe storage of the goods of those who had lost their homes.

Two Christmas present ideas

Immediately after the disaster a range of charitable operations were put in place, but this group of distressed, homeless people (coming from a much wider social range than Evelyn suggests) were also seen as dangerous by the civic authorities. # The world's first Fashion Blog, 1520-60

#### The Books of Clothes of Matthaus and Veit Conrad Schwarz of Augsburg

In 1520, aged 23, Mattheus Schwarz (above right) was made chief accountant to the Flugger merchant company in Augsburg. At the same time he began a collaboration with a 19 year old artist to document his outfits, looking back to before was born and continuing till he was 63. Each image is accompanied by a description of the clothes, and hints of surrounding events and lives.

A fascinating tale told in **The First Book of Fashion** (Bloomsbury), which reproduces the images beautifully, with detailed exposition of the circumstances around Schwarz's life, and the fashion, politics, and religious transitions of the times. Realistic and naturalistic portrayals in Northern European art coupled with worldwide trade (and its profits to spend), and new fabrics and colours triggered rich new tailoring. All spinning, weaving and sewing was by hand. Large Venetian mirrors were just becoming available to the rich, and could be seen in the magnificent Flugger 'golden writing chamber'.
